### **Actives' News**

Lambda Chi Alpha has had a very eventful semester. Although university sanctions prevented us from participating in any social or athletic events, we maintained our prominence on campus by focusing our efforts on different aspects of fraternity life. We sponsored fundraisers, such as a Valentine's Day rose sale, which raised \$900 and a mountain bike race which raised \$300. The proceeds, along with alumni contributions, paid for the 1991 house renovations. Several improvements have already been completed. The chapter spent \$400 on replacing the basement ceiling and spent over \$2,800 on our new two-level deck. More house renovations are being planned for early fall 1991.

The brothers also have remained active in the community. This semester Lambda Chi Alpha raised several thousand dollars for the Roberta Maxie Fund and organized the Carol Christian Post Polio Syndrome Fund. We have continued our weekly visits to the Fairview Adult Home and held bingo night for the residents.

The officers and sanctions committee have been dealing with the university since January and have not only met all judiciary requirements satisfactorily, but gone above and beyond that which the judicial committee asked us to do. We sponsored the "Double Vision" program, an alcohol and hazing seminar, in which over 500 pledges and associates campus-wide participated. We have also scheduled hazing presentations for other fraternities and sororities on campus to do away with hazing ignorance among greeks. The university returned our social and athletic privileges on March 7 and that midnight madness party will be one not soon forgotten by anyone in attendance. On March 30, we had another successful White Rose Banquet although we missed the company of Webby and soon-to-return Marine Tim Kerrigan.

Spring 1991 has been one of consistent improvement. Although we started out on probation, the true character of our fraternity was apparent. Since then we have been nominated for IFC awards including most improved chapter. In a few short months our accomplishments have returned us from probation back to our place as the best fraternity at Virginia Tech.

### 1991 House Renovations


The active brothers have completed two decks in the back of the house. The decks are adjacent to the house and overlook the back yard and the volleyball court. See the plans below. The brothers have also replaced the basement ceiling which was in bad need of repair. This is the first phase in the current house renovation plans.

In the fall, a contractor will be chosen to begin the interior renovations. These plans include constructing a new entrance off the deck into the rear of the first floor, converting the current living room into a Brotherhood Room, expansion of this room by eliminating the foyer, and connecting the Chapter Room to the new Brotherhood Room.

The brothers have been working hard to contribute to these renovations. They held a mountain bike race last fall which raised \$300 for the project and they sold roses on Valentine's Day which added another \$900. Each active brother and associate has contributed \$10 apiece. Finally, the actives contributed their time and labor ... they built the entire

deck (should we really walk on it???). The fraternity needed money only for the materials but that is only the beginning phase.

You recently received a brochure soliciting funds for these construction projects. Any contribution to these worthwhile projects will not count towards your Dotson Cup contribution. The fraternity has received contributions from 22 alumni already! They are still in need of more alumni contributions so that the next phase can begin in the fall. So get your contributions in soon.
